These lyrics stand for more than just a song. They stand for a celebration in the Old Testament. In 2 Samuel 6, David and 30 thousand of his men set out to reclaim the Ark of the Covenant and bring it back to Jerusalem. They had accomplished their goal and now were back in their city rejoicing over such a great thing! The Word says,

"David, wearing a linen ephod, danced before the Lord with all his might, while he and the entire house of Israel brought up the Ark of the Lord with shouts and the sound of the trumpets. As the Ark of the Lord was entering the City of David, Michal daughter of Saul watched from a window. And when she saw King David leaping and dancing before the Lord, she despised him in her heart..."

When David returned home to bless his household, Michal daughter of Saul came out to meet him and said, "How the king of Israel has distinguished himself today, disrobing in the sight of the slave girls of his servants as any vulgar fellow would!"

David said to Michal, "It was before the Lord, who chose me rather than your father or anyone from his house when appointed me ruler over the Lord's people Israel — I will celebrate before the Lord. I will become even more UNDIGNIFIED than this, and I will be humiliated in my own eyes..." ~ 2 Samuel 6:14:22 (NIV)

Every time I listen to this song, I imagine dancing through the streets like David and celebrating like he did. He knew God well and was never ashamed to celebrate the awesomeness of His Lord. Have you danced in the streets lately? Have you remembered what God has done for you? Do you celebrate the greatness of God daily? Are you willing to become "even more undignified than this" for God?
